

Walk Thru the Bible: Genesis

The Bible can be looked at as **B**asic Instructions **B**efore **L**eaving **E**arth. The Bible is the Word of God, scripture that gives us instructions on how to live while on earth. Il Timothy 3:16-17 confirms this by stating, "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: That the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works." The Bible is our guide on how to live and serve God through our lives. That is why it is critical that we read the Word of God, which is the Bible. Over the next few issues of the newsletter, we will walk thru each book of the Bible and give an overview of that book. This is designed to ignite a hunger and thirst for the Word of God.

<u>Genesis</u> – Hebrew: (בְּרֵאשִׁית) Bere'šyt, meaning "In [the] beginning"

- The first book of the Old Testament (the first of five books of the Torah or Pentateuch)
- Portrayal of Jesus: Jesus, Our Creator God
- 3 Divisions of Genesis:
 - Creation & Fall of Man
 - o Anti-Diluvian
 - The Patriarchs
- ❖ The foundational book for the rest of the Bible
- Writer: Moses (Exodus 24:4, Luke 24:27)
- Theological themes:
 - o The Doctrines of God, creation, man, sin and salvation
- Key People: The Holy Trinity, Adam, Eve, Cain, Abel, Noah, Abraham, Sarah, Isaac, Jacob, 12 sons of Israel including Joseph
- Key Verse: "So God created man in His own image, in the image of God created He him; male and female created He them." Genesis 1:27

Chapter Overview:

- Chapter 1-11: Creation, the Fall, the first murder, Noah & the flood, the Tower of Babel
- Chapter 11-25: Abraham's obedience, Lot, Sodom and Gomorrah, Ishmael, Isaac's trust, Isaac's marriage
- Chapter 25-36: Jacob marries Rachel, Isaac's twin sons Jacob and Esau, Jacob's ladder, covenant at Bethel
- Chapter 37-50: Joseph's life, the choice of Judah and Tamar, Joseph's family in Egypt






Celebrating Black History Month


Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Mastering the Basics

Many Christians fail to live the lives that God desires us to live because we have yet to "Master the Basics". We find ourselves falling into the same traps and patterns that so easily beset us, but we are to put those things behind us. Hebrews 12 says, "Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us...."

What are the basics of Christianity?

The Bible basics are things that every believer should know and believe in their hearts. The knowledge of God's word should be memorized and understood in your mind, yet confessed and accepted in your heart. These Bible basics also help to lay a foundation for which we can build upon as we read the Bible, pray and hear from God.
